BRINGING A NEW ZEALAND PERSPECTIVE TO CHINESE ECE STUDENTS

NZTC's Field Practice Advisor, Carla Hedgeman, recently travelled to China to spend a month teaching students enrolled in the Sino-New Zealand Cooperation Program.

The Sino-New Zealand Cooperation program, launched in 2014, is an exclusive agreement between NZTC and the Fujian Preschool Education College, the second largest early childhood teacher college in China. It provides Fujian College students with the opportunity to study courses delivered by NZTC that lead to a China Ministry of Education Diploma in Early Childhood Education and an NZTC Certificate in Early Childhood Teaching (Level 6).

During her time in China, Carla taught the program's first intake of over 160 students. Her lectures focused on the New Zealand early childhood education system and philosophy — particularly Te Whāriki (the Ministry of Education's curriculum policy) and how it can be applied to teaching practice.

"The students were passionate and interested in the New Zealand curriculum. They're open to a range of different ideas

and to having conversations, and that's an important step to having a great partnership and becoming effective early childhood teachers," Carla explained.

To improve her understanding of the Chinese ECE environment, Carla also visited kindergartens where students in the program teach.

"Through building relationships in context and visiting kindergartens to see what students are doing, I was able to build a whole picture of who we are teaching and how we can best support them," she said.

Carla left with a great appreciation for the potential of the students enrolled in the Sino-New Zealand Cooperation Program and for the capacity of the program to provide exceptional early childhood teacher training.

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EDUCATION COUNCIL OF AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND (EDUCANZ) ANNOUNCE CHANGE TO ENGLISH LANGUAGE COMPETENCY EXEMPTION

The Education Council of Aotearoa New Zealand (EDUCANZ), which replaced the New Zealand Teachers Council in July 2015, have announced a change to the English language requirements for all students who have English as an additional language and are applying to study ECE qualifications that lead to New Zealand teacher registration.

Currently, students applying for the Bachelor of Teaching (ECE) or the Graduate Diploma in Teaching (ECE) who have already completed a Level 7 or higher degree in New Zealand or Australia, are not required to provide International English Language Testing System (IELTS) scores unless New Zealand Tertiary College (NZTC) has concerns about their English language skills.

The change requires NZTC students who pathway from either the Bachelor of Education (ECE) or the Postgraduate Diploma in

Education (ECE) into our Graduate Diploma of Teaching (ECE) to provide an IELTS score of 7.0 in all components. Whilst this will be an additional step in the application process we are confident that our graduates will rise to the challenge.

Other applicants affected by this change are students applying to the NZTC Graduate Diploma in Teaching (ECE) after completing a degree at another New Zealand or Australian tertiary institution. They too will be required to provide an IELTS score of 7.0 in all components.
